Course Description:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand and utilize broadcast, film and media terminology.
- Practice professional television and film production safety techniques.
- Identify different types of careers within the television and film industries.
- Demonstrate employability skills such as teamwork, punctuality, and communication.
- Perform the three stages of film production within a collaborative group.
 - **Preproduction** – Plan for projects by preparing treatments, scripts, and storyboards.
 - **Production** – Safely set up, operate, and put away video and audio equipment.
 - **Post-production** – Use video and audio editing software to produce a finished project.
- Students will be responsible for producing the morning announcements as a part of WWPK and the monthly magazine show, The Paw.
- Students will create original audio and video content with opportunities to participate in competitions at the county and state levels.

Course Units:

Video Editing, Script Vocabulary, Script Writing, Shot Composition, Sound, Sound Editing and Mixing, Graphic Design, Filming, Creative Storytelling, Interviewing, News Terms, News Stories

Course Materials: DSLR cameras, Mac computers, microphones, tripods, Canon Vixia cameras

Grade Determination for Assignments:

Teachers use a variety of ongoing, developmentally appropriate methods to measure student progress such as tests, exams, rubrics, quizzes, projects, reports, homework, class participation and other assignments. Grades reflect all evaluations, and each piece of work or each assignment; teachers use their own judgment in determining how much weight to give each graded activity. Student grades will be determined by using the following categories:

Major (70 %): An assignment or assessment that is cumulative in nature, measuring multiple standards/skills, and/or when there is a significant amount of dedicated instructional time devoted to the content being assessed.

Minor (30%): An assignment or assessment that measures an individual standard or subset of standards/skills within a unit and/or when there is a small amount of dedicated instructional time devoted to the content being assessed

Practice (0%): Daily assignments, observations, and/or engagement activities given in class or for homework given to students to build and/or remediate skills. Practice has a maximum weight of 15% in the grade book for Middle and High School.

Grading Scale:

Grades are based on the individual student's mastery of standards, in the Georgia Performance Standards for the grade level in which the student is currently placed. End of Semester grading will reflect the following:

A = 90 and above

B = 80-89

C = 70-79

F = Below 70

W = (1-100) Withdrew/Pass or Fail

NG = No Grade

INC = Incomplete

Office Hours/Help Sessions:

8:25 AM - 8:55 AM and 4:00 PM - 4:25 PM by appointment only. Office hours include time for remediation, help sessions, and parent conferences. Please contact Mr. Kwederas via email to schedule an appointment.

Recovery Process:

All students will have **one (1) opportunity each nine weeks** to redo/retake one (1) **major assignment/assessment**.

- Eligibility for a redo/retake is for students who receive a 79 or below on a specific major assignment/assessment.
- Students are eligible to earn a replacement grade on a redo/retake no higher than 79.
- Student redo/retakes must be completed before the next major assignment/assessment is given or five school days before the end of a marking period if there is not another major assignment/assessment given (exceptions can be made for students who have excused absences during this five-day window).

Make Up Work:

A student is permitted and encouraged to make up work missed because of absences. **It is the student's sole responsibility to contact the teacher(s) to initiate all make-up work.** The contact must be made within one school day of returning. If a teacher is not available, the student needs to inform the principal or designee of the desire to make up the missed work. The teacher will establish a reasonable schedule within which the make-up work will occur beyond two consecutive days of absences. Work missed during the last week of the grading period must be made up by the tenth school day of the next semester.

Academic Honesty (*The Honor Code/Honesty*):

Students are expected to be honest and submit his/her own work. Cheating, plagiarism, and other Honor Code violations are strictly prohibited. Examples of violations include but are not limited to copying or "borrowing" from another source and submitting it as one's own work, seeking or accepting unauthorized assistance on tests, projects, or other assignments, fabricating data and/or resources, providing or receiving test questions in advance without permission, or working collaboratively with other students when individual work is expected. The "Honor Code/Honesty" is Rule 9 in the Fulton County ***Student Code of Conduct & Discipline Handbook***. If a student is caught cheating at RTMS, he/she will be subject to a tiered system of consequences listed in the RTMS Student Handbook.

Students will develop an online portfolio at www.youtube.com as well as a YouTube channel. Students will be instructed on proper guidelines for social media and will post on social media pages not limited to LinkedIn, Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Reddit, in class and out of class.
